

Many events—good, bad, and “unrated”—occurred during the unusual year 1968. It was a time of great unrest and of new ways of seeing things. Lorri Ungaretti will point out some of the many ways this year was unique in San Francisco. She will talk about the Vietnam War, social unrest, assassinations, sports, music, and more. This is not a critical interpretation of 1968, but merely a chronicle of the many events that affected us locally during that year.

Lorri Ungaretti serves as an editor for the publications issued by the San Francisco History Association and the San Francisco Museum and Historical Society. Lorri has authored several books about the history of San Francisco’s Sunset and Richmond Districts.
