

Famed naturalist and writer John Muir took many calculated risks in order to observe nature – from setting out on a glacier with a dog in a snowstorm to chasing a forest fire. Mike Wurtz will share some of these adventures, illustrated with Muir's drawings, letters, and journals, and examine how Muir used his masterful observational skills to study, promote, and protect "anywhere that is wild."

Mike Wurtz serves as the head of the University of the Pacific's Holt-Atherton Special Collections and Archives. He oversees the access, acquisition, and preservation of over 1000 archival collections, as well as the largest collection of John Muir material in the world. Mr. Wurtz holds degrees in history, geography, and library science. He teaches courses and gives presentations about Muir, and is the author of *John Muir's Grand Yosemite* – a guide to where Muir made his drawings of the area.

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
